

SEPTEMBER PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

<u>Planning</u> - The Parish Council had no objections to the erection of a detached double garage and annexe being built at Troy, Church Field. Planning permission had been granted by SCDC for repairs and improvements to the garage and studio at Te Awahou (formerly Mill House). Planning permission had also been granted for change of use and the erection of a two-story extension to Manor House, The Street but permission had been refused for the erection of a two-story building in the garden of Manor House. Permission had also been granted for a new dwelling house at Sandy House, Manor Close (the existing dwelling to be demolished).

Local Issues - The Council were informed that there was no law against fishing nets being placed close to the shore. A letter had been sent to the Ministry of Fisheries concerning the subject. The vacancy at 7 Adams Lane had been allocated to a local couple; the Parish Council was pleased at this outcome. The Environment Agency would be asked to repair a fence on the sea wall and to check the floodgates. A hole that had appeared on the road to the Bailey Bridge had been reported to the Highways Department.

<u>Emergency Care Network</u> - Primary Care Trusts will be taking over responsibility for ensuring medical care and advice can be accessed outside of surgery hours Full information about this service is posted on the notice boards on Stocks Green and the Village Hall.
